Kohlberg's theories of moral development are divided into three levels that consist of a total of six stages. Everyone starts out at the first stage and then develops morally as they mature. Each stage represents a graduation in the level of moral development, with stage one being the least moral and stage six being the most moral.

There are three stages in Piaget's Theory of Moral Development. In stage one, children are not concerned with moral reasoning as they prioritize other skills such as social development and dexterity. In stage two, children submit to authority and show absolute respect for regulations.
